Helping or Not Helping?

The dictionary defines suffering as the physical and mental pain that a person is feeling. Today I am especially thinking of ways that we can approach people who are hurting in a big way as my friend has serious medical issues and is suffering. I want to be kind in my words and actions so I reviewed the book, *Don't Sing Songs To A Heavy Heart* by Kenneth C. Haugk, Ph.D, a resource for parish nurses.

Romans 12:12 (NIV) says, *Be joyful in hope, patient in affliction, faithful in prayer*. Romans 12:15 (NIV) states, *Rejoice with those who rejoice; mourn with those who mourn.* Note that Paul doesn't say, "rejoice with those who rejoice, and also rejoice with those who mourn because it will get them to feel better." And what happens when one is suffering so much that it is hard to be patient? Experiencing grief or suffering with a heavy heart does not happen to people only when there is a death of a loved one or when they have a serious health issue. It also happens when there is physical disability, loss of a job, caregiver burnout, infertility, birth of a special-needs child, miscarriage, divorce, natural disaster, trouble with the law, hospitalization, parenting struggles, spiritual crisis, unwanted pregnancy, depression and other things.

As a parish nurse we meet people right in the midst of their struggle, but do we meet them alone? No! 1 John 4:12 (NIV) says, *if we love one another, God lives in us and his love is made complete in us.* The love that we bring to a suffering individual is more than a mere reflection of God's love. It IS God's love. It is Jesus who makes it possible for us to be worthy and to be kind in this type of situation. We have our feelings, our fears about talking with someone who is deeply hurting and our own wounds, our own hurts. The key to caring for that individual is to remember to keep all of these in focus so that the person receives the best that God has to offer through us.

Caring includes being silent and opening both ears instead of the mouth. After listening to the person, we are able to validate their feelings as it lets them know that they are heard and believed. Their tears are cleansing and healing. Share their suffering with a simple touch and sincere eye contact. Simple acts such as these display God's love through us. The book also reminded me that one thing to avoid is "pink thinking". It glosses over the hurting person's pain by trying to banish any dark and gloomy thought. Pink thinkers believe that their role is to prod the suffering individual out of the despair and propel them into hopefulness. The phrase, "Look on the bright side!" is what a pink thinker might say.

Even though a part of us wants to encourage them in this way, in my experience, this is not helpful to someone with a heavy heart.

Parish nurses seek out resources such as this book to learn (and review) best practices for kindness and care of parishioners and community members. What a blessing when God places us next to someone who is suffering, who has a heavy heart. Take a deep breath, ask the Holy Spirit to guide your words and actions as you reach out in kindness.

The 32rd Annual Parish Nurse and Congregational Health Ministries National Conference will be held May 15-16, 2024 at Concordia University, WI.

The theme of the conference is: Caring Alongside: the Essence of Parish Nursing and Congregational Health Ministries. The theme verse is Galatians 6:2 (NIV), *Bear one another's burdens, and thus fulfill the law of Christ.* The breakout sessions for this conference will include information on the following: diabetes, loneliness, nutrition, caring for people with dementia, end-of-life, and the impact of Florence Nightingale on nurses perception of caring.

LCMS Parish Nurse Council: offers a 17-module course for RNs wishing to become Parish Nurses in collaboration with the Lutheran Nurses Association of Australia. The schedule is flexible and encouraged to be completed within six months. Many complete the course in less than six months. The course was developed by practicing clergy and parish nurses and reviewed by LCMS clergy and practicing parish nurses. Module 17 is specific to the organization and resources available for parish nurses within the LCMS. The course is designed for the RN as an introduction to parish nursing, but it can be adapted to others within the health professions wishing to serve as congregational health advocates. Personalized mentoring is provided throughout the courses and periodic optional zoom meetings are provided to add the group discussion component. LPNI study tours offer Parish Nurses and others from around the world the opportunity to learn network and support one another, share experiences and models of practice, meet with pastors, deaconesses, and others to enjoy fellowship with like-minded people.

Upcoming Study Tours

2024: Alaska: September 10-18, 2024

The 2024 LPNI Alaska Study Tour arrangements are now complete! The previous trip coordinators have had health issues and could no longer continue with trip preparations. LPNI is working with a new travel agency because of cost constraints. We are excited that this study tour will help participants learn more about the Indigenous People of Alaska as well as health services in Anchorage and remote areas. Our trip will be several days less but we have reached out to several organizations in Alaska that are eager to share with our group their Christ-Centered mission work to those in need.

Registration forms show a cost of \$2,605 per person (double) and \$3,255 (single room) but LPNI is honoring the previous costs of \$2,500 and \$3,000 respectively. These costs do not include airfare. LPNI will pick up the extra cost, but some registrants indicated that they will be willing to make up the difference.
